SCTG: Who We Are

Described as "smart theatre for children" by the Los Angeles Times, the Silver Lake Children's Theatre Group (SCTG) uses theatre to develop critical thinking and self-confidence, as well as to engage the imagination. Our plays and programs are designed to develop and nurture young talent while broadening their awareness of culture, politics, and aesthetics. Most importantly, the SCTG builds community.

Celebrating our 23nd anniversary in 2023, the SCTG began in the early 90s as a spring theatre program for kids based at the Hollywood-Los Feliz Jewish Community Center. Loanne Hamrin and Trish Boyer directed and produced several terrific musicals (*Guys and Dolls, The Music Man, Show Crazy, e.g.*) before retiring in 2000.

In 2001, Broderick Miller agreed to direct one play in order to keep the program alive - and he's still here. The kids program officially became the Silver Lake Children's Theatre Group a year later with Kelbe Bensinger, Brian Davis, William Delvac, Mark Feldman, Jayne Goldberg, Sandi Silbert, Kathleen Nolen, and Miller providing the key leadership. Incredibly, Bensinger, Feldman, Nolen, and Miller are still integral parts of the SCTG to this day. During his stewardship as Artistic Director, Miller inaugurated a second season of plays to be performed in the fall and established director and writing mentorships. Nearly every play is now cowritten by one or more SCTG students. Miller's creative philosophy was to explore

the human condition through dramas, comedies and musicals that challenged and inspired kids intellectually as well as emotionally. By approaching sensitive subject matter (divorce, peer pressure, controlling parents, gender issues, diversity, drugs, sex, politics, religion, etc.) openly and honestly, the SCTG became a safe and supportive community forum for teenagers trying to better understand themselves and their place in the world.

"The essential SCTG play," suggests Miller, "is a search for wisdom with bittersweet results."

The SCTG welcomes new members from the ages of 8-18 years old. Children will learn a great deal about the acting craft and theatre lore - things like voice control, physical movement, confidence, timing, and finding the truth. Knowledge and skills that will help them in future theatrical endeavors.

They will learn a lot more about professionalism - being prepared, being on time, responsibility, self-discipline, respecting the process, and collaborating with colleagues. Knowledge and skills that will help them in life, whether they are an actor, a plumber, a teacher, a businessperson, a social activist, or a rocket scientist.



President/Artistic Director Broderick Miller

Broderick Miller is an Emmy Award-winning screenwriter with a B.A. in Film Studies from Claremont-McKenna College. His film career began at age 19 when he sneaked backstage at a London Theatre to thank director Lindsay Anderson for making the movie *O Lucky Man!* This meeting changed Miller's life – Anderson adopted him as his protégé and mentored him as a director. Broderick served as Anderson's assistant on several film projects, including First Assistant Director on *The Whales of August* (1986) starring Lillian Gish and Bette Davis. Broderick's first spec script, *Deadlock*, was turned into an HBO movie starring Rutger Hauer and Mimi Rogers and remained HBO's highest-rated original movie for over eight years.

In addition to his feature work, Miller has written network TV movies, direct-to-video features, prime-time TV pilots, and won a 2001 Emmy for writing *Grandfather's Birthday*.



Steven Spielberg optioned his script, *The Escape Artist*, for several years, and the project still attracts producers who buy expensive bottles of wine at dinners and say a version of "We have (Chinese) money and we're definitely going to make it happen this year...." The wine is usually pretty good. Broderick has proudly served as the SCTG President and Artistic Director since its founding 24 years ago.

When he is not directing, Broderick enjoys exploring the world with his daughters, having enjoyed recent odysseys to Japan, Wales, England, Mexico, France, Prague, Patagonia, New Zealand, Australia, Antarctica, Argentina, Chile and Brazil. And, as always, baseball weekends in San Francisco with daughter Maddie and his beloved Giants.

Both of his daughters, Izzy and Maddie, grew up in the SCTG program and he is especially proud of his work with them. He is grateful for the large extended family of friends and surrogate sons and daughters he has adopted (and who have adopted him) through the misadventures of this theatre company.

Who We Are: Featured Profiles

Aimee Hopkins - Choreographer

Aimee Young Hopkins has worked extensively in literacy and arts education since 1988. Originally from Rhode Island, Aimee achieved her B.A. Magna Cum Laude from Middlebury College in Vermont and her M.A. in Theatre from Trinity Rep Conservatory in Rhode Island. Aimee received the prestigious "Golden Apple Award" from LA Unified School District in 2002. She has taught English in Latin America and toured the U.S. as an Artist-



in-Residence. Before settling in Los Angeles, she won First Place in Rhode Island's NATS Vocal Competition and several honors at the Solo/Ensemble Competition for Vocal Music. Since coming to the west coast, Aimee has performed in musical theatre and in her own musical one-woman shows and original plays. With her company, Aimee Art Productions and with the Music Center of Los Angeles, Aimee continues to offer quality arts instruction at schools and non-profits throughout the Los Angeles area. She is passionate about using the arts as a tool to build literacy and self-esteem.

David Joyce - Music Director

David Joyce is a Grammy winning singer/keyboard player based in Los Angeles. He's toured with the world and played with the likes of Burt Bacharach, Natalie Cole and many others, and sung with or for Frank Sinatra, U2, Michael Jackson, Oasis, David Byrne, Chris Isaac, Neil Young, and Harry Belafonte. David has sung for such movies as *Battle for the Planet of the Apes, Rogue One (Star Wars), Star Trek: Beyond, Jurassic World, X-Men 2, Spiderman 3, King Kong, Matrix 2&3)* as well as TV shows. He's been the Vocal Department Head at the LA College of Music since 2015. In Italy and Spain, he leads clinics and workshops on a variety of musical topics.



Samantha Sidley - Vocal Director

Miss Samantha Sidley, declared "quietly radical" by the LA Times, is an artist with over 20 years in the music industry. Her talent was evident from an early age when she made her first stage appearance as Sarah Brown in SCTG's *Guys and Dolls* when she was 12 years old.

After a full scholarship to Berklee College of Music, she debuted at the legendary Oak Room in NYC's iconic Algonquin Hotel.

Since then, she has had the privilege of touring and recording as a background singer for renowned artists such as the The Foo Fighters and The Bird And The Bee. Samantha has also sung backgrounds for Paul McCartney, Queen, Nile Rodgers, and more.

In 2019, Samantha released her debut record, "Interior Person," which

garnered critical acclaim and was named in the Top 10 Albums of the Year in the LA Times. A front page feature wrote: "The lush but swinging sound happily conjures memories of Ella Fitzgerald, Blossom Dearie and mid-'60s Dionne Warwick."

SCTG Writing Mentorship

Every season the SCTG offers a mentorship for students looking to develop writing skills through the experience of authoring a play. It's not easy. The time commitment is considerable, the responsibility and self-discipline even more so. However, those who survive learn craft while discovering their creative voices. They are also rewarded with the thrill of authorship – seeing a creation of theirs performed on stage that is also a lasting piece of work that represents their artistry and dedication. The fall plays authored by SCTG students tend to be one-act productions; and the student-written spring plays are always musicals with ambitious staging, scale, and thematic scope.



This season's student playwrights - <u>Sophia Menedez</u> and <u>Elleni Samaras</u> - posed a high-octane mix of old and new SCTG personalities. Sophia joined us way back in 2013 as a sevenyear-old, playing a softly comedic wedding photographer assistant in the play *I Do...But I Really Don't*. She quickly became a fixture of the core SCTG stock company, distinguishing herself as one of our most exceptional dancers, singers, actors, and comediennes.

Two years ago, we thought we had forever lost Sophia when she moved to Atlanta. But the fates dealt us a sweet hand when she returned to Los Angeles last year, in time to wow audiences with a hard-hitting dramatic performance in last fall's *The Bro Code*. It also allowed her this final SCTG play to write and act in before graduation.

Mars or Die! co-author, Elleni Samaras, first joined the SCTG for 2018's musical, *Walk On By.* Although she played one of many kids attending

"Art Camp" in the story, we immediately took notice of Elleni's innate comic instincts and distinctive style. From play one, Elleni excelled at one of the most difficult challenges of acting (particularly for children) - appearing natural. Because of her own grounded confidence and unique personal style, all of her SCTG characters have breathed with impressive depth and authenticity.

Sophia and Elleni first approached me with great enthusiasm about a rough story idea they had about a rocket train headed for Mars. This initially confused me because I just couldn't put my head around railroad tracks extending from Earth to Mars. Who built them? How did they build them? Why a train and not a rocket ship? Finally - and taking more time than you might imagine - the rocket train became a rocket ship, and we were off and running.

Sophia and Elleni's original idea was to explore the different classes populating an epic (train!) journey, and eventually this was refined to a rocket ship without the separation of classes – mostly because we didn't have enough actors to create a meaningful and complex dual class system. The central idea of the play shifted more to a collection of personalities who all agreed to a oneway trip to Mars for various compelling reasons. We started with the characters and spent a great deal of time working on a surface personality and an interior personality that would be revealed in layers.

Writing sessions were great fun and hyper-productive. Elleni and Sophia were eager to learn the craft of writing and, from the start, the three of us established a rock-solid respect and trust for each other's voices and opinions. I cannot overemphasize how important this is to the writing process. There was little second-guessing and everyone freely voiced concerns and suggestions to improve the story, dialogue, and characters.

Among many wild and wonderful adventures with SCTG student writers, this experience with Sophia and Elleni will be one of my very favorites. Hopefully, their intelligent and sensitive exuberance for complex characters, engaging narrative, and concern for humanity is evident in the play you will see tonight.

Notes From Young Playwrights

Sophia Menendez: In my ten years with the SCTG, I thoroughly enjoyed acting in the plays and musicals. However, one thing always nagged me in the back of my mind - I never wrote a play. I deemed it too ambitious for me and believed I lacked the creativity to do so. I also figured it was too late for me to ever write one, as I only had one musical left. Can you see where I'm going here? Last summer, Elleni and I were discussing how we both hoped that the next musical was going to be spectacular because we had so many departing seniors. Then, a realization dawned upon us, "You know what? WE should write the next musical!" So after countless late nights, glitchy Zoom calls, and edited scripts, we have Mars or Die! I feel as if this endeavor represents a fitting conclusion to my involvement with the theater group. I truthfully could not have asked for a better co-writer to work with. Elleni has always been such a joy to have in this group, so to have been able to share this experience with her is beyond what I could have imagined. I particularly enjoyed creating the individuality of the characters. Because of all the seniors graduating, we wanted something memorable for everyone to enjoy and have creative freedom with. We spent months just developing these characters so each actor knows they play a character that has significance and purpose. While not everything about the writing process was easy, I can confidently say this has been one of the most rewarding adventures I've ever taken part in. Seeing how much fun our actors were having with the material truly made the experience. I cannot thank Broderick, Elleni, Beja, and all of our amazing actors enough for bringing this idea to life. Thank you all so much.

Elleni Samaras: Mars or Die began to form in June of last year, as the incredible Sophia Menendez and I laid upon the strange gray sand of Manhattan Beach. We came to the realization that the upcoming spring musical's cast party was going to be particularly devastating, and that we needed to be a part of it. The bones for the story were crafted in an Amtrak overnight train headed up the Pacific coast for Oakland with my dear friend, Helena Korzen. You'd be surprised how much inspiration can come from Newman's Own strawberry jam. Working with Sophia and Broderick has been incredibly impactful upon me as a writer and as a person. Meetings were always such a joy; we indulged in more than our share of inane brainstorming and oddly specific references (shoutout Succession!). One of the most significant parts of the writing process for us was character development. We wanted to have a very wide selection of unique characters to allow everyone to be as weird and out-there as they could, which was so, so successful. I'm grateful for the role I was allowed to play behind the scenes and to Brod for being so open to Sophia and I's vision. I love love love each and every person who contributed to Mars or Die individually (especially Beja - sorry for turning this in a week late) and I couldn't be happier about any of this!

Ella Webber (Anastasia Voronin / Greek Chorus / Dancer) Atwater Elementary, 5th Grade, Age 11



Awards

El Phoebax Award

Each year we honor an actor(s) for outstanding achievement in character. This is not an acting or popularity award. The award was instituted in 2001 as the "PhoeBax" award, named after its two founding winners, Phoebe Minette and Baxley Andresen. These two actresses defined the exemplary kind of character we seek to encourage and nurture. They arrived on time for rehearsals; they were focused on the process; they took direction and worked hard on their notes; they were quiet when they needed to be; respectful to the crew and cast; sensitive and generous with their peers; and, most important of all, they brought a special kind of positive energy to the experience. In 2012, the PhoeBax Award underwent a name change to reflect the remarkable contributions actress Ellie Bensinger made to the SCTG, and has hence been known as the "El PhoeBax Award." Having your name on this trophy is the highest honor within the SCTG.

The El PhoeBax Award winner is given an individual trophy as well as having their name engraved on a perpetual trophy.

SCTG Rituals & "Often Heard At Rehearsal"

Michael Travis

There has been a Michael Travis in nearly every play since *The Puzzle People*. Michael Travis is the name of the main character in the Lindsay Anderson film, *O Lucky Man!* and is Broderick Miller's pseudonym when writing screenplays of dubious quality.

The Name Fine

It is the belief of this company that every actor be treated with equal respect regardless of age, background, or talent range. When the director forgets or confuses a name, he fines himself and awards the actor with a dollar to acknowledge and apologize for the disrespect. Siblings – especially twins - are especially challenging. The director conservatively estimates that he's given out over \$1000 in name fines over 19 years. Eventually he will learn to address Mady Fairey as Mady and not Amanda.

"My Apologies To The Cast"

Beyond all, the SCTG teaches professionalism – self-discipline, preparedness, ownership, and respect for colleagues and the process. Arriving late for rehearsal is not only disruptive, it is disrespectful. When an actor arrives late, they are expected to hurry into the room with alacrity and then apologize to the entire cast for their lateness. The cast then rates the urgency of their arrival and the sincerity of their apology out of 10 points (10 being best). If you get a 10/10, your apology is appreciated and acknowledged. If you rank 6/10 or lower, your disrespect is compounded. The director is held equally accountable.

The Gold Coins

Frank Miller was possibly the most generous man to ever walk the planet. He would put a handful of gold dollar coins in his pocket every morning and give them to random people throughout the day. This was his way of spreading cheer and goodwill. Frank Miller died on May 13, 2004, the day of dress rehearsal for *Attack of the Killer Kids*. The following day, Broderick gave a golden coin to each young actor to honor his dad's memory and generosity. Ever since, the gold coins are passed to each actor before the final performance of that year's spring play.

"Stay Awake"

Listen carefully: every play one character will say the line "stay awake!" as a nod to our very first SCTG production *Stay Awake!*
